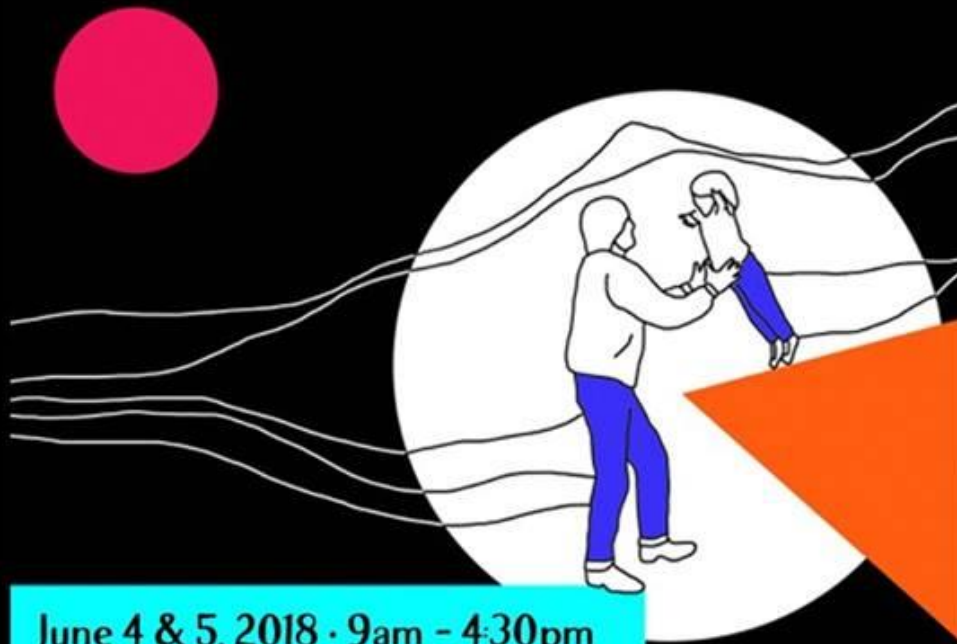

Crime Prevention and Victim Services Trust Fund – Spring 2018

Village of Teslin - 2018 Summer Programming

The Village of Teslin will provide weekday afternoon camps and evening programming for children and youth ages 6 to 18 years old. The project will include ongoing boys club, girls club and youth club. The project also includes three week-long, all-day camps: an Elephant Thoughts science camp, a Breakdance Yukon Society dance camp and a Monkey Business gymnastics camp. The camps will be delivered in Teslin and surrounding areas between June 15 -August 31, 2018. The goals of the project are to reduce the incidence of crime by offering youth in Teslin a safe place to do during the summer months to be active, mentally engaged, and learn new skills.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Yukon – Community Mentoring Project

The Big Brothers Big Sisters of Yukon mentoring program matches an adult with a child for a fun and safe friendship so that the child feels valued and has a friend to talk to. The program occurs in the community with the child and adult going on outings or meeting in their homes. There is also an in-school mentoring program which has the same goals, however the child and adult meet at the school and participate in activities that are available at the school, such as games and sports. Currently there are school programs at Elijah Smith Elementary, Selkirk Elementary and Takhini Elementary.

This project continues and augments the current mentoring program in Dawson City and Whitehorse. This would include monitoring the existing matches, recruiting new volunteer mentors and mentees, safety training for both and case management of the program. The goal is to provide a mentor for each child in Yukon who would like one.

Yukon Youth Outdoor Leadership Association – Community After-School Sports Program

Offering 28 sessions of an after school program (3:30 – 5 p.m. four days a week for seven weeks) focusing on cultural programming at the Canada Games Centre in partnership with CGC, Yukon Aboriginal Sports Circle, Dornonn Fox, Boys and Girls Club of Yukon, Skookum Jim Friendship Centre and Kwanlin Dun First Nation.

Thursday – partners would be able to participate in the Thursday programming that is currently being offered by CGC with funding from CPVST.

Possibly additionally on Friday - Hand Games

A meal would be offered following each session from 5:30 – 6:30 p.m.

Youth accompanied by youth service providers from the partnering programs would participate for free. Youth who are not connected with these organizations would be able to participate through the drop-in passes provided by CPVST funding.

Dawson Shelter Society – Wen-do Women's Self Defence Course & Workshops

Dawson Shelter Society, in collaboration with Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in First Nation will be bringing Wen-Do (Canada's longest running women's self defence organization, based in Ontario) to Dawson City to conduct self-defence sessions and workshops about violence prevention and responsive care.

Workshops include:

- 15 hour weekend course for 20 females ages 13+
- 2 – 3 hour session for FN women (19+ age) to discuss shared experiences and feelings about violence and crime prevention
- 1 hour information session for all females ages 11+ about different types of self-defence including awareness and verbal and physical defence, general safety and local resources
- 2 hour session for youth ages 11 – 18 to focus specifically on youth needs and options for prevention and response.

Yukon Tourism Education Council - Multicultural Centre of the Yukon Youth Program Summer Camp

Ten week summer day camp from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Multicultural Centre for male and female youth in grades 1 – 7. Ten registered youth will be accepted weekly and two spots will be kept for drop-ins. Youth will be divided into age groups of 6 – 9 years and 10 – 13 years.

The focus will be on English second language, reading and arithmetic through activities including: arts and crafts, book club, math club, sports, themed events, walking tours, games, field trips and guest speakers from other youth organizations to provide information about their programs.

**Little Salmon Carmacks First Nation –
LSCFN Historical Youth Hunting Practices; Connecting with ourselves, archery**

Archery classes twice a week in two sessions respectively for ages 13 – 18 and 19 -24, for a period of eight sessions. The goals of the project are to teach First Nation cultural values of caring, sharing, respect and self-control. This project aims to empower and reconnect First Nation traditional hunting practices and encourage cultural revitalization.

Dawson City Music Festival Society – Yukon Girls Rock Camp

The fourth annual Rock Camp to be held July 15 – 21, 2018 in Dawson City and to be expanded to Whitehorse as capacity has been reached in Dawson City. Each camp would follow the same format and would include music education and workshops tailored to three age groups 8-9 years, 10 – 12 years and 13 – 18 years.

Topics include: media literacy, band dynamics, women who broke barriers in music and society, issues for northern girls, fashion and style in gender and sexual orientation, junior counselor, traditional singing and culture and being allies for others in the community.

The camps would end with a public performance of a collaborative song written by the girls at the camp. In Dawson City this would take place at the DCMF; in Whitehorse at a place to be determined.

A total of 40 participants applied to YOB in our first year of operations, 27 were eligible, eight did not qualify, and five withdraw without knowing their eligibility.



One of the most popular barriers for employment among the participants is inexperience, followed by newcomers and indigenous people. **24** participants are female and **16** are male.



One requirement for being part of YOB is to raise the minimum wage at least **\$1**. The average wage offered has been **\$20**

Yukon Child & Youth Advocate Office

The Yukon Child and Youth Advocate Office is an independent office of the Yukon Legislative Assembly that represents the rights, views and preferences of children and youth who are receiving or eligible to receive government services and programs. These services may be in the areas of Family and Children's Services, Health, Education, Mental Health or Youth Justice. The Advocate's primary concern is to ensure that a child or youth's rights views or preferences are heard and considered in decisions that affect their lives.

In addition to individual advocacy, YCAO provides systemic advocacy as well as public education about the role of the office and the rights of children.

- Individual advocacy – there continues to be in high demand for services. We promote children's rights (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) in government services and track Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) calls to action regarding Yukon government decisions regarding children and youth.
- Systemic Advocacy – YCAO is conducting an independent systemic review of the experiences of children and youth in Yukon group homes. The Advocate is currently reviewing advocacy issues for children and youth and will be developing an advisory group to assist with the review. Interviews with children, youth, families and workers will be conducted in Sept, and Oct. Prior to that, if children youth or others have concerns about the experiences of children and youth in group homes, please have them contact the Advocate.
- Jays care Foundation – YCAO's partnership with Jays Care Foundation has been successful in developing 20 youth coaches (mostly 12 year olds) who have been running 8 ball programs throughout the Yukon promoting the right to play. This TRC reconciliation project will end with a celebration and tournament on June 22nd and 23rd at the KDFN baseball field and the Softball Yukon complex.

- in full summer mode with Youth Programs... have hired all our post-secondary staff for the Y2C2 and CAT Camps; deadline for Y2C2 Field Worker positions is this Thursday, May 30...these youth get extensive and valuable training and experience in conservation work and general life skills
- the senior staff have been trained to deliver bear safety to elementary school students, and will be doing 42 talks over two weeks, and reaching an estimated 850 kids in the Whitehorse area
- we're working with Education, and a number of First Nations and Renewable Resources Councils to develop and implement a renewed Southern Lakes Caribou Education Program to help kids and communities learn about the caribou in their neighbourhood
